"I went to school here in Tumut but there was no Aboriginal cultural content in my education. I went to school with Aboriginal people, but their culture was ignored. So personally, I've learnt and grown.

The **Narragunnawali program** has had a huge impact. Reconciliation and Indigenous perspectives have been embedded within our philosophy, in the way we work and how children are educated. We are known for this and this is what we are very proud of. The reconciliation program has also significantly increased the attendance of First Nations children at the preschool, with enrolments of local Aboriginal children lifting to 16-20% of all enrolments."
